COVID 19: Nothing New Under the Sun

Throughout human history pandemics, diseases prevalent over a whole country or world, have been our constant companions from time immemorial. The Antonine Plague of 165 to 180 AD, was brought to the Roman Empire by troops who were returning from campaigns in the Near East. Throughout the 17th and 18th centuries a series of pandemics, best known as the "Great Plagues", routinely ravaged Europe. Today we are faced with the outbreak of the Coronavirus disease which has spread across our nation and the world, with a death toll of 198 thousand persons. Those most at risk are older adults and people of any age with underlying health conditions, such as diabetes, lung disease, or heart disease.

Looking back a little more than a century ago the Spanish influenza pandemic was considered the most severe in recent history. It was first identified in military personnel during the "Great War." It is estimated that nearly 500 million people became infected. The mortality rate reached 50 million worldwide, with about 675,000 occurring in the United States. Persons most susceptible were those younger than 5 or 65 and older. The effects of the Spanish influenza were devastating here in South Central Pennsylvania as well. The following excerpt from an article entitled *A Brief History of Masonic Charity* on the Pennsylvania Grand Lodge Website provides a look at the charitable relief efforts employed by Pennsylvania Freemasons during the 1918 outbreak.

"The influenza outbreak of 1918 devastated the world, killing an estimated 50 million people in contrast to the 16 million who died during World War I. With soldiers trekking across battlefields and returning home, the virus spread rapidly. One-fifth of the population worldwide suffered from the influenza outbreak to some extent, and one-fourth of Americans contracted it. The influenza epidemic struck the Elizabethtown, Pa., area as severely as other locations. In a grand gesture of service to the community, doctors transferred the Masonic Homes residents without influenza from the Philadelphia Freemasons Hospital to the Grand Lodge Hall Infirmary and opened the on-site hospital to community members with influenza. "This became a splendid asylum for the sorely stricken



families of the vicinity who had no place else to go," the Committee on Masonic Homes reported. During the several months the hospital took patients from the community, 82 people with no Masonic affiliation received the best treatment possible. As a result of quarantines and precautions, no Masonic Homes residents or guests died from the influenza epidemic."

Today, due to the severe health risks imposed by the Coronavirus, and to assist in lessening the virus's impact on the brethren, Bro. Thomas Gamon IV Right Worshipful Grand Master has directed the suspension of all Masonic events, stated meetings and social functions, schools of instruction, youth and social meetings across the state until further notice. Redirecting their efforts, Pennsylvania Freemasons continue to contribute to the welfare of others during this health crisis by continuing to serve and protect our homes, communities, and nation though their various professions and businesses.

As a result of the current quarantine, and safety precautions implemented at the Masonic Villages, there have been no reported deaths from Coronavirus. In order to safeguard the residents living within the nursing and personal care areas, residents must spend most of their time in their rooms. The caring staff do all they can to brighten the day of each resident, however we have the opportunity to help brighten their day as well by visiting https://masonicvillages.org/sending-smiles/.



From the Desk of Bro. Kenneth W. Womack, PM Principal, Third Masonic District School of Instruction



Brethren All,

The work of the evening for the originally scheduled SOI on March 23rd was the Funeral Service and Examination of a Visitor. Since we did not have that meeting, I thought the newsletter would be a good place to discuss some of the aspects of a Masonic funeral not actually part of the service.

It is important to remember that no Brother can be interred with the ceremonies of a Masonic funeral unless he has been raised to the degree of a Master Mason and who at the time of his death, was a Master Mason in good standing in a Lodge, unless by virtue of a dispensation by the Right Worshipful Grand Master (Section 9.02 of the Ahiman Rezon). Occasionally there have been requests for a Masonic funeral when a Brother did not meet these requirements.

Remember that the family must make a request for a Masonic funeral service. It is probably most appropriate for the Lodge to notify the funeral

director that the Brother was a Mason and for the funeral director to ask the family if they want the service. The Lodge should not take it upon itself to do a service unless the family asks. For that reason, it is also important to understand that you make your wishes for a Masonic funeral service known to family members.

There is a now a specific form available to express your PA Masonic Last Wishes. You should consider giving a copy to your spouse, your grown children, any siblings, brothers, sisters, parents or others you believe might be concerned. This form provides a specific place to designate whether you want a Masonic funeral, and if so, who you would like to do the funeral service. Also, there is a place on the form to identify whether you wish to be buried or cremated, and if you have a Past Master's Apron, whether or not you want it buried with your remains or given to someone. There is also space to designate specific persons to receive personal Masonic items you might want to give away.

As a reminder, at the service, Masonic Dress should be worn by the Worshipful Master, Senior Warden, Junior Warden and Chaplain, if at all possible. Attending Brethren should wear dark clothes, aprons, and gloves, though gloves tend to be optional as there are usually not enough available.

For those who have not had a chance to attend a Masonic funeral, I would suggest that you get a copy of the service and become familiar with it. It is not very lengthy and provides a good overview of what to expect in the service. It is available in Section 9.02 of the Ahiman Rezon and can be found in the Worshipful Masters Handbook. Contact your Lodge Secretary if you would like to have a copy.

Solomon's Magic Mood Ring

This story is a middle-eastern folk tale, possibly originating in Persia (now Iran). It gained popularity in the English language courtesy of Bro. Edward Fitzgerald², who is best known for translating *The Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam*. Over time the story behind the phrase has grown, and also appears as a Jewish/Yiddish folk tale^{3,4}. I myself first heard the story from a Pakistani military officer. I've made my own alterations to better fit the Masonic audience.

Our story takes place during the reign of King Solomon. Solomon's Captain of the Royal Guard, Benaiah⁵, had been with Solomon from the beginning and was one of Solomon's most trusted advisors; but, Benaiah had become a bit snobby and boastful, claiming that he had never failed in his duties to the king. So, King Solomon decided to humble Benaiah by sending him on what he thought would be an impossible task.

Solomon summoned Benaiah before his throne and told him "Benaiah, I have heard of a great ring. It has the power, when looked upon, to make a despairing man joyous, but to make the joyful man weep with sorrow. I want you to personally find this ring for me. I trust no one else with this task. I wish to wear it for the harvest festival. This gives you six months to find it."

Benaiah assured Solomon he would return with the ring and went out to begin his search. Benaiah traveled extensively throughout the Kingdom and neighboring lands. He asked the best jewelers and wealthiest merchants, the most popular soothsayers and magi, but none had heard of such a ring. He visited the emissaries of far away lands, but they too could offer no help. Finally, the day before the harvest festival, tired, worn, and weary, Benaiah returned to Jerusalem, distraught at his own failure.

Word had gotten around of Benaiah's quest and even the common people spoke of it. As he re-entered Jerusalem there was some carefully hidden tittering among some of the populace; there are always those who take joy at the distress of others. There was one who wasn't snickering however. Through the crowd approached a youth, a brass-worker's apprentice. "Lord Benaiah, we have heard of your quest. I think I can help you if you will come with me to my master's shop."

Benaiah, having nothing to lose at this point, followed the youth into a dingy part of the city he'd never lowered himself to enter before. The youth led him through alleys into a small market area and then into a crumbling one-room shop with a ragged piece of cloth for a door. The youth lit a lamp, knelt for a short prayer, then took a small piece of brass from the scrap bucket beside the anvil and set to working it. After

piercing a hole, he rounded and beat the ring smooth, gave it a quick polish, then took a fine set of chisels and did some careful engraving. Benaiah watched with interest the entire time, amazed at the skill of this youth. Benaiah knew he could never do such a task himself; yet this was only an apprentice. The youth finished the engraving, gave the ring another quick polishing and handed it to Benaiah while holding up the lamp so he could inspect it.

The ring was nothing more than a plain smooth ring of brass, with only three words engraved upon it, but Benaiah jumped for joy and gave the lad all the money and treasures he had with him and promised to send more.

The next evening at the opening of the great harvest festival, King Solomon again summoned Benaiah before his throne. Solomon wore a large grin, as did most of the other advisors who were in on the joke. "Benaiah, have you brought me that ring, which I sent you to retrieve?"

Benaiah approached the throne and handed a small gold-covered box to the king. Solomon surprised opened the box, took out the simple ring inside, saw the words upon it and began to weep, for upon the ring he read "Gam zeh ya'avor – This too shall pass."

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The 'Memento Mori' or reminder of mortality is a common theme in Freemasonry throughout the world. In many jurisdictions, after being prepared, the candidate is left in a 'reflection chamber' to await his entrance into the Lodge. This is most common in jurisdictions working the Scottish Rite/Continental version of the Craft degrees, but has started to appear in those using the York workings as well. It is one of the elements being encouraged by the Traditional Observance/Masonic Restoration movement⁶. The chamber of reflection is often decorated with black hangings, hourglasses, skulls & crossbones, coffins and other mementos mori.

The legend of the third degree is itself a memento mori. In the Preston-Webb versions, we find our Grand Master H.A. at his mid-day devotions contemplating his own mortality by a recitation of the 12th chapter of Ecclesiastes. This book, whose authorship is attributed to our Grand Master King Solomon, when read as a whole [it is a fairly short, but rewarding read], gives us a view of someone struggling through despair and depression. We can imagine King Solomon, after receiving the ring from Benaiah, distraught at his own greatness being but a fleeting thing, writing the words of Ecclesiastes – "Vanity of vanities, all is vanity." He was at a seeming high point, only to be reminded it would soon pass.

We must remember the other side of this however. No matter how far down we are beaten down by the evils of life, no matter how many times we feel we've been hidden among the rubbish, carried away from all that is good and important to us, buried under the cares of daily life in a dark place where we think we'll never be found... This too shall pass, and we can look forward to being raised up in that embrace of fellowship.

In the meantime, we pulled together 20 of our brethren to reach out to all of our brothers that are in the high risk category of the virus (over 60). They each called on 25 of our members to check on them and remind them the Lodge is still here to support them if needed. The calls were well received by all

and we found that some were struggling with sickness personally or with family members. Information we never would have found out had we not reached out to them.

For my part, I began personally calling on all of the Widows of our deceased brethren, over 130 of them in all, to let them know they are being thought of and we are here for them. I found many wrong or disconnected numbers, but more importantly, I had the pleasure of speaking to many wonderful women who were very glad just to have received the call. Many were apprehensive to answer a call from an unknown number and some called me back after I left a message. All I spoke to were well taken care of, having family tend to them, or being in homes that were treating them well. They all were touched just to be reminded that they were remembered. Several were so touched by the gesture that I could hear the tears in their voices. The conversations were so pleasant too, I got to learn about what they were doing to keep busy, how they were keeping in touch with friends and family, and it was very uplifting.

In addition, through Facebook, I learned of a tradition of the UGLE, where brothers meet to raise a toast to those that cannot be with us. They were even doing it remotely over the internet. Brother Tim Dedman, our lodge Secretary, and I decided this is something unofficial we could do to keep the brethren in touch with each other. Bro. Dedman set up a ZOOM site where, every night at 9PM, we meet, have a few toasts and carry on over whatever subject comes up, masonic related or not. Most often not. It is open to all masons and non-masons, although, so far only a few non-masons (my wife for example) and several pets have joined us. I believe we have counted brothers from 5 other jurisdictions joining us for the shenanigans. Check out our Facebook page for the ZOOM information and password and join us! I don my unofficial top hat and use my log gavel to un-officially bring the meeting to order and close. It's almost like being at lodge, but not really. It has been quite a stress reliever and a great deal of fun. We will keep it up as long as lodge is closed down and we can stand to see each other's faces.



The Pennsylvania Lodge of Research Stated Meeting scheduled for June 20, 2020 at the Harrisburg Scottish Rite Building is cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic, The Grand Master has suspended all Masonic activities in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania through and including June 1. In addition, he has cancelled the Grand Lodge Quarterly scheduled on June 6 in Erie. This action was taken due to his concern for the Masonic population of Pennsylvania. I make my decision to cancel our Pennsylvania Lodge of Research Stated Meeting with a heavy heart, but I believe it is in the best interest of the health and wellbeing of all Masons.

Many Pennsylvania Masons are in the "older" age and health category that is most susceptible to an adverse outcome. Many deaths nationally have occurred primarily in this group and some

have occurred in the younger population, as a result of their exposure to the virus. In this age of declining Masonic membership, I do not want to tempt fate by potentially exposing our Brethren to this grave disease.

At the present time no vaccine or cure for Covid-19 virus exists, and as indicated by national healthcare leaders, nothing is on the horizon for the immediate future. Social distancing with a 6 foot distance, including the use of masks, is in effect now and for the foreseeable future. Whether these issues will require a continuation of the medical safeguards into the summer months is likely, but is still anyone's guess at the current time.

In lieu of this action, I want to encourage the officers and members to continue their efforts to grow our Lodge of Research by gathering petitions for membership. We have made some outstanding progress in the focus of the Lodge. We offer an expansion of knowledge and fellowship. We meet twice a year to benefit the Masonic experience of all involved, through voluntary presentations of well-researched papers by knowledgeable Brethren.
