The USA and France: Wartime Allies and Peacetime Friends

Much of my attention lately has been on the daily news about COVID-19, arranging childcare for the summer, and preparing for my family's summer vacation. Speaking for myself, it's nice to turn on the TV or go online and see something that's not about COVID-19, or the 2020 Presidential Election, or incidents of civil unrest that are dominating the news cycle. On June 6th, when the segment in the nightly news came on about D-Day. I had a moment where I thought "oh wow, today is the D-Day anniversary". For those of you keeping track, this year marked the 76th anniversary of D-Day and the Battle of Normandy.

After watching the tribute to this momentous day, I checked my email and saw that I had a message from the DDGM

waiting for me. Some of you, especially current WM's, are probably thinking to yourselves "Dan, I get a million emails a day from Jeff...only one a day is a cake walk". Brother WM's, I ask you the following question: you think you get a lot of emails from Jeff? I was his Junior Warden the year he was in the East...enough said. Bro. Jeff asked me if I would contribute an article for this newsletter on the topic of Freemasonry and World War II, which I gladly agreed to do. I thank Bro. Jeffrey R. Miller, DDGM for this opportunity and Brother William L. Britton, PM for helping me develop my thoughts for this article.

France was instrumental in our independence from Britain during the American Revolution; we returned the favor by liberating France from German occupation and oppression during World War II. As early as June 1775, France began sending supplies (in secret) to the Continental Army. A more formal Treaty of Alliance between France and the Colonies was signed in February 1778, which included greater financial and material assistance. Some scholars believe that France offered such generous assistance to the Colonies because

Founding Fathers (and Freemasons) such as Benjamin Franklin followed the cultural influence of the Enlightenment. Principles of the Enlightenment are interwoven in the Declaration of Independence and the US Constitution. Some of these principles which should be familiar to Freemasons are the sovereignty of reason, toleration, fraternity, constitutional government, and the separation of church and state. British actions such as taxation without representation, oppressive taxes, and The Quartering Acts (which required colonists to provide British soldiers lodging and food in the colonists' private homes) are completely contrary to these Enlightenment principles.

Much like the hardships endured during British Colonial rule, France endured hardships under German occupation. The harsh reality of daily life in France during these years (approximately May 1940 to December 1944) included perpetual shortages of basic needs such as food and fuel, as well as onerous regulations regarding censorship and the constant barrage of Nazi propaganda. Moreover, Germany instituted a program of forced labor which transferred hundreds of thousands of French workers to Germany – against their will – for the German war effort. German persecution of Jews extended to France as well, where approximately 49 concentration camps were in use, Jews were required to wear the "Yellow Badge" (a yellow Star of David) and were restricted to traveling in the last cars of the Paris Metro.

The liberation of Western Europe from German occupation was a massive undertaking, to say the lease. Nearly 160,000 Allied troops participated in D-Day; by August 1944, approximately 2,000,000 Allied troops were in Western Europe. The battle to liberate Paris began on August 19, 1944 and ended with the German surrender on August 25, 1944. Once Paris had been liberated, the Allies began their march to the Rhine River and the ultimate prize - Berlin. The Battle of Berlin took place between April 16, 1945 and May 2, 1945. Adolf Hitler committed suicide in his bunker on April 30, 1945. The German Army surrendered to the American Ninth Army on the morning of May 7, 1944, ultimately ending World War II in Europe.

Rebuilding Europe after the defeat of Nazi Germany was both physical and cultural; the process was referred to as "denazification". Part of this process was intended to re-establish societal institutions in former German territories that experienced the hardships mentioned earlier in this article. Freemasonry was initially severely restricted in German-occupied territories and was eventually banned completely. The Nazis blamed "high-ranking Freemasons" for Germany's defeat in World War I and asserted that Freemasons were conspiring with Jews to create a "New World Order". Germany's Parliament passed a series of Acts that ordered the dissolution of Masonic Lodges, the confiscation of Lodge property (both physical and monetary) and prohibited any Freemason from holding office in the Nazi Party. Masonic concentration camp inmates were graded as political prisoners and wore a red triangle symbol on their prison uniform. The first meeting of a Lodge of Freemasons in Germany after World War II occurred in May 1948 at *Lodge Libanon zu den 3 Zedern* in Erlangen. This roughly translates to "The Lodge of Three Cedars of Lebanon".

US-French relations after World War II were generally warm, according to some scholars. Part of the Marshall Plan included generous loans to France with no repayment requirements. French political and industrial leaders toured the US extensively to learn information about rebuilding government and business. The US-French relationship continues to be important to both countries to the present day, as both the US and France figure prominently in international affairs. Perhaps this relationship was summed up best when then-President François Hollande made an official state visit to the US in February 2014. Hollande toured Monticello (the home of Thomas Jefferson) and remarked, "We were allies in the time of Jefferson and Lafayette. We are still allies today. We were friends at the time of Jefferson and Lafayette and will remain friends forever". ¹

It has been quite a while since we last meet under the






Hosted by Carlisle Lodge No. 260 and Orrstown Lodge No. 262


