Our Most Violated Duty?

The stipulation of 'three miles' as relates to our duties to respond is sometimes taken as purely symbolic. The number three appears often in Masonic ritual, so it is easy to assume that its use in this instance is merely a reflection of the various other triples that appear: the Lights – both Greater and Lesser, the principal officers, the three degrees.

But three miles to our ancient brethren, and even up into the last century, was a very practical and literal limitation on the bonds we owe. Three miles is the distance a man can reasonably walk in one hour. It was expected that a man could travel an hour, one way, to attend the meetings of his Lodge. If we were to convert this mileage based on modern transportation 'inflation', we could easily make it 30-60 miles.

What we today call 'Notices' were once referred to as 'Summonses'. Now the term 'Summons' is normally reserved for specific types of meetings such as Masonic trials. Today our notices are sent via the government's postal service or through email. Previously, each summons was delivered by hand. The Tyler was usually given the responsibility of delivering the notices. This is one of the reasons for our continued tradition of the Tyler being a paid position.

I have never heard of a Mason in modern times ever being charged for failure to respond to a meeting notice. I did receive a message from a Brother military veteran telling me a Lodge in Texas has a voluntary fine of \$1 assessed for each meeting the member fails to attend Lodge. The voluntary fine is payable at the Brother's next attended meeting. This makes for a light-hearted tangible reminder a Brother's Masonic duty to attend Lodge, however it may deter long time neglectors of lodge meetings from ever returning.

In the end, everything we do in Freemasonry has some symbolic meaning, but that meaning is easier to interpret if we understand the full significance.



You have heard the adage that you never get a second chance to make a first impression.

So, as the WM you open the stated meeting, and when the SW gets to his part of the dialog for opening, he says, "...strictly prohibiting all impropriety of speech and conduct that may prove" After the meeting, a 20-year past master comes up to you and tells the SW it should be, "...all impropriety of speech or conduct...." This PM probably couldn't begin give the whole dialog himself (okay, there may be an occasional exception to this, but it would be rare), but he knows one word was wrong!


I point this out because there are key parts of our ritual, both for Lodge meetings and for conferring degrees, which resonate with the Brethren because they are significant parts of the ritual that we are used to hearing. And if we get those key parts wrong, a lot of people recognize it, even though they don't

Regardless of whether you are a WM, SW, JW, Chaplain, or just giving the charges for the evening, make sure you have the ritual down cold, to include every word, especially in those key parts. If you don't, the Brethren notice. Well done Lodge openings set the tone for a good Lodge meeting, and a poorly done Lodge closing can detract from what was otherwise a very good Lodge meeting. WMs should know the charges cold. Wardens should know their dialog perfectly. This doesn't happen if you don't rehearse it, both as Lodge and as individuals. Just because you did it well last month doesn't mean you are going to do it well this month. Like many other PMs, I learned this the hard way! Use Lodge rehearsals to go over openings and closings. As individuals, spend some time going over your part or parts before you get to the Lodge

The same is true of conferring degrees. While there are very few who consistently get every "which" and "that" in the degree ritual correctly, there are key parts that most Brethren recognize when they are not done correctly. The obligations are an extremely important part of the degrees, and they should be delivered perfectly. Other significant parts of the degree are also important, such as "…but that copious dews watered the earth by night…" and "…he was known as …" to mention just a couple of examples. That is not to say you won't draw a "blank" on occasion and need help, but when you know it cold, that is less likely to happen.


This attention to detail demonstrates to Lodge members and visitors alike that your Lodge takes pride in its ritual and it does honor to the Craft.

The Orders of the Star and Garter, Roman Eagle, and Golden Fleece



The reference in the ritual to "The Star and Garter," "The Golden Fleece," and "The Roman Eagle" continues to be a puzzle in the archeology of words.

There is much disagreement as to what the founders of our Speculative Craft meant when they selected these three orders to represent the qualities of Ancient and Honorable.

It must be remembered that the Masonic Apron as it is displayed and presented in the Modem Speculative Craft has only existed since 1723. Prior to that year there is no written record of the Apron being a Masonic symbol of any kind.

As a matter of record, the Apron, or Abnet, had always been the symbol of the Priesthood and was reserved for those of religious authority in all nations.

The Golden Fleece referred to in the ritual has created a difference of opinion among Masonic authorities. Some claim it is in

reference to the ancient Golden Fleece of Mythology or Jason's Golden Fleece. While others, such as Mackey (one of the best known Masonic authorities) state that the Golden Fleece did not refer to Jason's Golden Fleece in mythology, but to the Woolsack of Parliament. It was a commercial venture to build up the public interest in the wool trade. This so-called order of the Golden Fleece was begun by Charles of England in 1629 and gradually spread throughout the world. There was no real great honor involved; it was highly commercial.

The Roman Eagle is another questionable badge or symbol. You will find disagreement due to a difference in ritual in the several jurisdictions. In most jurisdictions it is referred to only as Ancient, while others refer to it as both Ancient and Honorable. Among Masonic authorities there are very few who will venture a guess as to its origin or selection in the Masonic ritual.

The original Roman Eagle or standard of Rome, which carried all over the known world by the Roman legion, was a badge of honor to which only the Romans held an allegiance. The only way in which Masonry might be interested in it as a symbol, or to look upon it with Masonic pride, might be the great loyalty with which the Romans all looked upon it. So great was their pride in the standard that they willingly gave their lives to protect it from disgrace.


It may well be that our Apron should instill in us a pride as great or even greater; however, this is only my supposition and must be judged by each one in his own heart.

Of the three noble emblems referred to, the Roman Eagle, Golden Fleece and Order of the Garter, only the Order of the Garter had a most noble and chivalrous beginning. At a royal ball held by the King of England for one of his sons, the Queen of England (who was not too popular among the nobles and ladies) was dancing. In the heat of the dancing her garter slipped from around her leg and fell to the floor. Very embarrassed herself, she froze. The assembly stopped dancing and stared at the garter on the floor. A very gallant knight or noble (there is much disagreement on just who it was) stepped forward. With a sweeping bow to the Queen he bent and retrieved the garter and instead of returning it to the Queen, which would have embarrassed her even more, slipped it very gallantly over his left hand and up over his arm above the elbow. Then with another bow to the Queen, he took her hand and, nodding to the orchestra, began to dance. The King was so proud of the gallant gesture, which saved the Queen's face and prevented any further gossip, that after the dance he walked to the gallant noble, requested his sword and bade him kneel. Then, touching him on each shoulder, he proclaimed the Order of the Garter and its first member. The Order of the Garter was conferred only on knights and nobles who exemplified chivalry toward the ladies and women wherever they might meet them. -As time went on the Order was used for other less gallant reasons. At what period in history the word "Star" was added to "The Order of the Star and Garter" is unknown to the author at this time.

Big Spring is resuming 'normal' meetings in September. We are tentatively planning for a Chicken BBQ the second Saturday of October. More information to follow.


